












Ed Urban, Executive Director Scientific Committee on Oceanic Research




I've been working with the colleagues from BODC for the past 10 years and I had the great opportunity to meet many nice and kind colleagues who always provided me with prompt and very high quality support.


The almost daily interactions went beyond the work relationship so I really would like to congratulate with you BODC friends for this important anniversary celebration and wish you all the best.







